

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

Environmental & Indigenous Cultural Education Programs and Impact

- > Delivered 155 school and adult programs
- >Reached 6418 students from 86 schools
- > Delivered 6 experiential workshops to 210 adults
- Provided Skw'une-was orientation sessions at longhouse to 185 parents and 15 teachers
- >Over 200 teachers and 287 parents/chaperone volunteers participated in school programs
- >53% of program participants were from the North Vancouver School District (NVSD)
- 100% of NVSD elementary schools participated in at least one of the in-district school programs
- Awarded \$9700 from the North Vancouver Outdoor School Alumni Society bursary fund to support 91 students

Diversity and Inclusion

We recognize and value diversity as it contributes to the rich educational and community-based learning experiences that are central to our vision. We support and accommodate all students in order to provide for the greatest opportunities for success.

Adaptations and supports for students with diverse needs include:

- Flexible stays, overnight supports for caregivers, pre-site visits, coordination with partner groups (i.e. Vancouver Coastal Health) and effective communication and pre-trip planning
- Site and facilities built and maintained with accessibility in mind to provide excellent access to buildings and outdoor learning spaces
- Activities designed to enable students to engage to the best of their ability in a wide range of learning experiences
- Ongoing staff training in social-emotional supports, student transitions and diversity, and developing awareness of complex learning needs
- >Meal service is nutritional and student-centred, with a comprehensive food restriction and allergy response plan in place

Youth Leadership Program and Impact

- Twenty ODS Alumni assisted staff in training 204 high school counsellors over three intensive counsellor training workshops – 4,284 volunteer hours
- Filled 336 youth volunteer placements to support the Outdoor School program – 17,829 volunteer hours
- Retained 79% of high school counsellor trainees who volunteered during FY2017, and/or signed up for fall 2018

Career Internships and Impact

Cheakamus Centre hosted six internships that allowed young adults and early-career professionals to gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of the natural world.

- S Environmental Education Leadership Interns developed leadership and interpersonal skills in the field with the environmental and leadership programs
- 2 Community Field Experience teacher candidates brought new ideas and energy across programs, and expanded their concept of potential learning sites while participating in spring practicums
- I Head Counsellor Intern gained valuable experience in facilitating outdoor education programs, and developing strong leadership skills through direct supervision and mentorship of counsellors and youth




"I have the Outdoor School sewn into the fabric of my being.

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Community Engagement and Impact

Community volunteerism is at our core, and makes a specific contribution by generating well-being for the site, people and region. Volunteers lend a hand with farm, gardens, trails, conservation and fundraising activities.

- Continuing to grow meaningful individual and group volunteering opportunities to support campus renewal projects and Friends of Cheakamus member events
- 3rd year partnership with Sea to Sky Community Services providing a welcome and inclusive environment for adults with developmental disabilities to become more independent, make friends and practice communication and social skills
- 4th year as host venue for World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms (WWOOF), an international volunteer help exchange of "education, culture, and sweat"

Facility & Special Event Rentals and Impact

Our natural setting enriches gatherings and events by fostering deeper human connections within communities, and between people and nature. Proceeds from facility and site rentals support school programs and facility upgrades.

- Provided venue space for meetings, retreats, family celebrations, summer camps and institutes for 86 groups from the local and broader community
- Finalist in the Professional BC Wedding Awards: Best Reception Venue and Best Catered Wedding
- Partnered with the Firefighters Burn Fund for another successful year as host venue for the annual Young Burn Survivors Camp. Since 1994, over 1000 young burn survivors aged 6-18 kids have attended this camp for a week of fun, connection, and support
- > Celebrated 26 years as home base for Artist for Kids' Summer School of Visual Arts
- 5th year transforming the hatchery into the summer base camp for Wedge Rafting's whitewater scenic float tours on the Cheakamus and Elaho rivers

50th Annual Open House Community Day

The Annual Open House is a highly anticipated family day of nature exploration and discovery. This popular community event is co-hosted with the North Vancouver Outdoor School Alumni Society.

- Proudly celebrated the milestone 50th Annual Open House with special anniversary activities and fanfare
- Welcomed over 2,200 visitors to the site to participate in nature activities, and learn about the wide variety of programs and services available to the community
- Raised funds for the Outdoor School for Kids Bursary that will provide for over 20 students to participate in life-changing overnight learning experiences in FY2019

Sustainability and Impact

Cheakamus Centre continues to implement green practices in our operations to ensure we tread gently on the earth, and inspire and engage our students, staff and visitors in sustainable best practices and environmental stewardship.

- Reduced dependency on commercial food suppliers through sustainable development of the farm and onsite edible gardens, greenhouse and honey bees
- Diverted nearly 8000 kgs of food waste from the landfill which was used for animal feed and composting for gardens; pigs consumed over 3,500 kg of food scraps diverted from the landfill
- Processed over 250 kgs of our own pork and collected nearly 1500 eggs used in the Cheakamus kitchen
- > Pressed 10 liters of apple juice and collected 250 litres of maple sap with the help of students
- Implemented variable speed pumping at ELC for the geo-exchange loop to reduce electricity consumption and peak electrical demand
- Piloted new strategies and technologies for cabin retrofits, such as centralized heat recovery ventilation and natural flooring

Cabins Energy Retrofit Project

Wildlife Conservation and Impact

Since 1981, Cheakamus Centre has been restoring historic salmon habitat to support five species of Pacific salmon and large overwintering populations of bald eagles.

As a result of successful partnerships with Nature Conservancy of Canada, Fisheries and Oceans Canada, Squamish Nation and many local and regional conservation organizations, the property has the most restored side-channels in the Squamish Watershed.

- Released 39,510 salmon fry with the help of students and visitors 28,561 Chum and 10,949 Coho
- Collaborated with Sea to Sky Invasive Species Council to assist with detecting and eradicating invasive species on the property and dike
- Strengthened partnerships with Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC), Squamish River Watershed Society and Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program to continue to protect spawning channels and other sensitive habitats in the Dave Marshall Salmon Reserve



Cheakamus Foundation and Impact

Established in January 2009, the Cheakamus Foundation for Environmental Learning "Cheakamus Foundation" is a registered charity that works to support the ongoing success and viability of Cheakamus Centre.

- Secured over \$185,000 in grants and donations, and additional in-kind from BCIT, Fisheries & Oceans Canada, Farm to School BC, Nature Canada, Pacific Salmon Foundation, RBC, Rick Hansen Foundation, Squamish Arts Council, TD Friends of the Environment
- > Completed two cabin retrofits for a total of 4 cabins renovated with accessibility enhancements
- Facilitated two indigenous youth programs BCIT High Performance Tradesperson and the second year of the Indigenous Youth Leadership summer program
- > Hosted the sold-out 2nd Annual River Feast Fundraiser
- Grew Friends of Cheakamus membership to 250 members, and offered 6 Friends of Cheakamus family-friendly learning events
- Launched 50 Years 50 Faces campaign acknowledging special individuals and partners over five decades
- > Strengthened organizations' capacity for long-term collaboration with post-secondary partners
